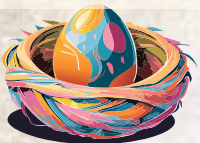

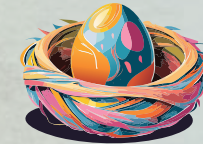


My idea is to create a prototype for a website for:

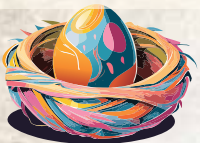

1. Lynda.com

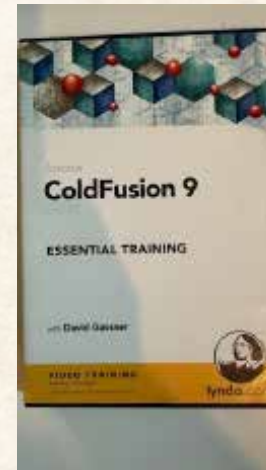
I will start with lynda.com. I think this is one of the best place to learn more about the different software and develop new skills to improve your work.

The business grew very fast. At first use to be offering cds - I remembers I still have some of them. After couple of years they changed to a subscription plan but very expensive. Use to be around 400\$ but now is 20\$ a month.

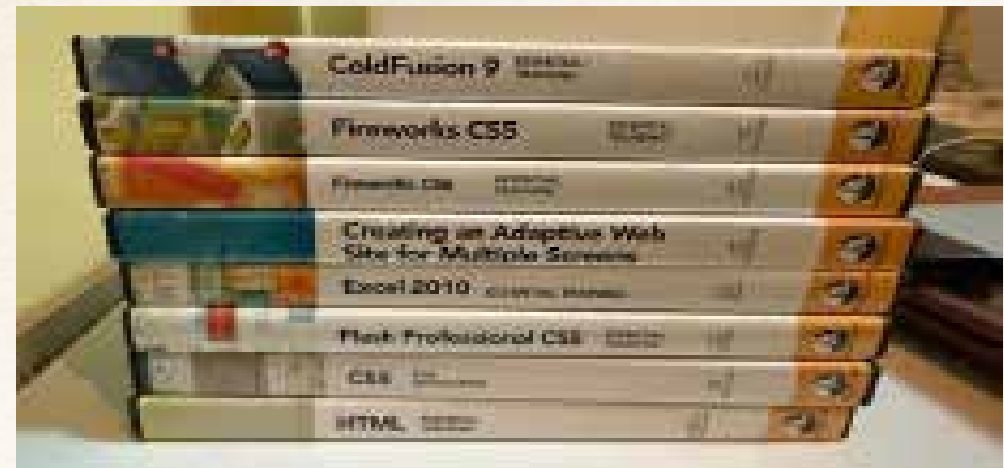
lynda.com was acquired by LinkedIn in 2015 for **\$1.5 billion**, so now is part of the LinkedIn site.

The classes are separated on levels - beginner, intermediate and advanced.



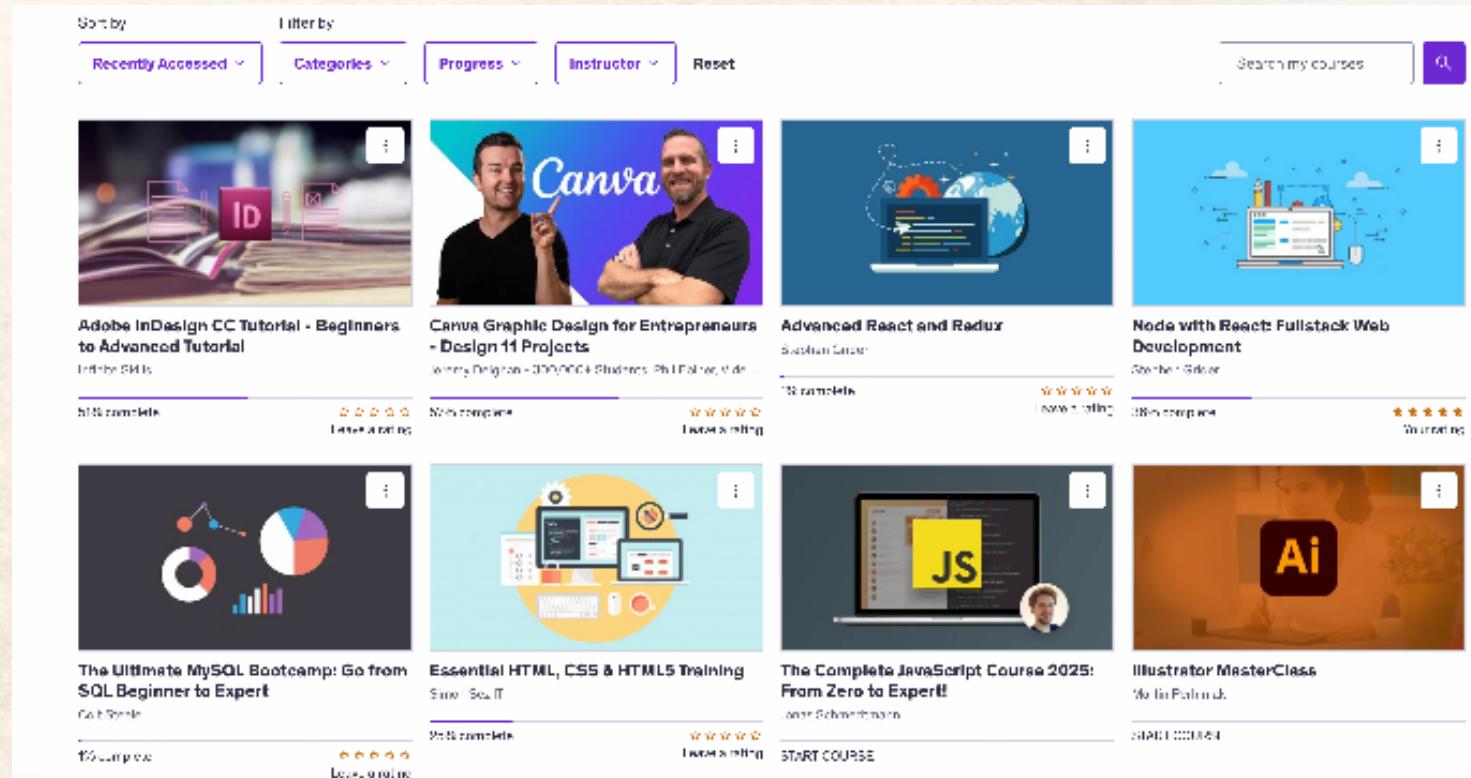

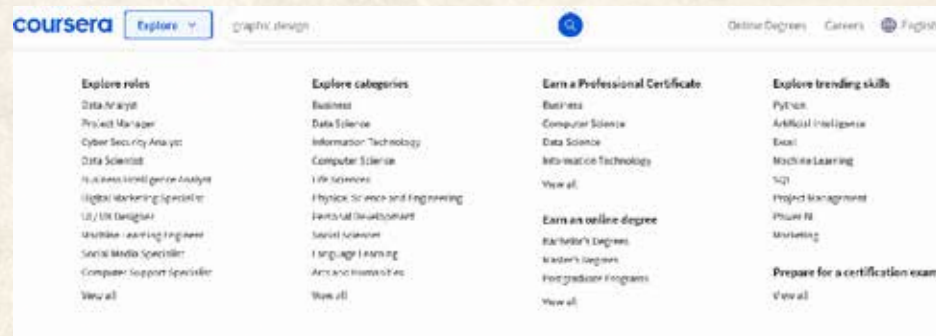
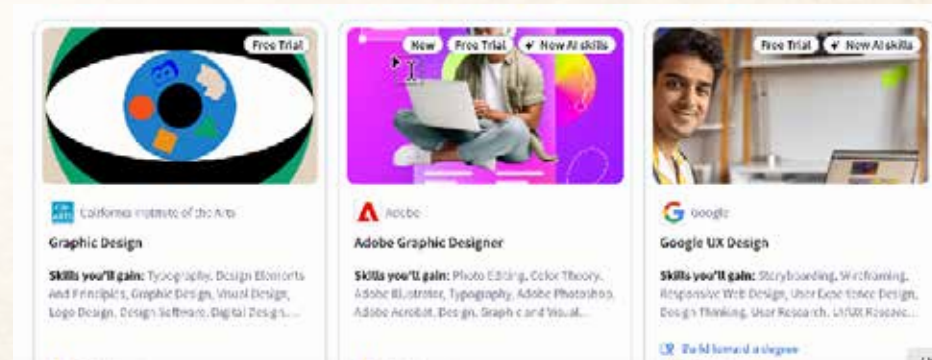
The platform is different - you can pay for a individual course - they can vary between 5\$ to 200\$. There is no subscription plan like Lynda.com.

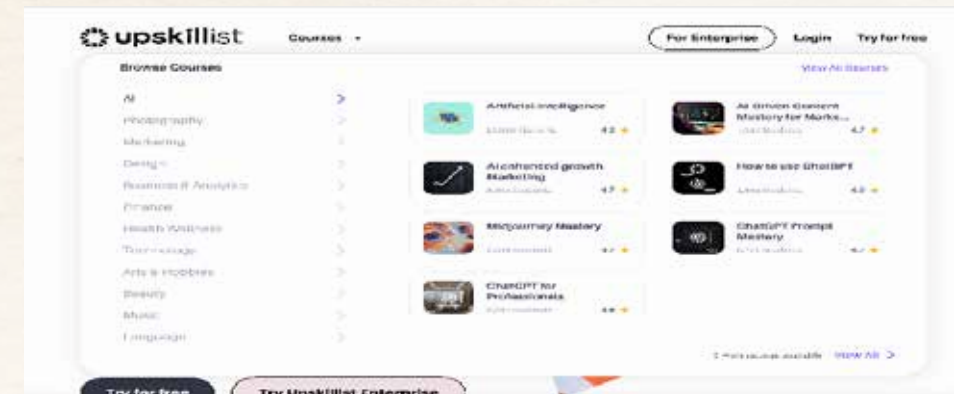
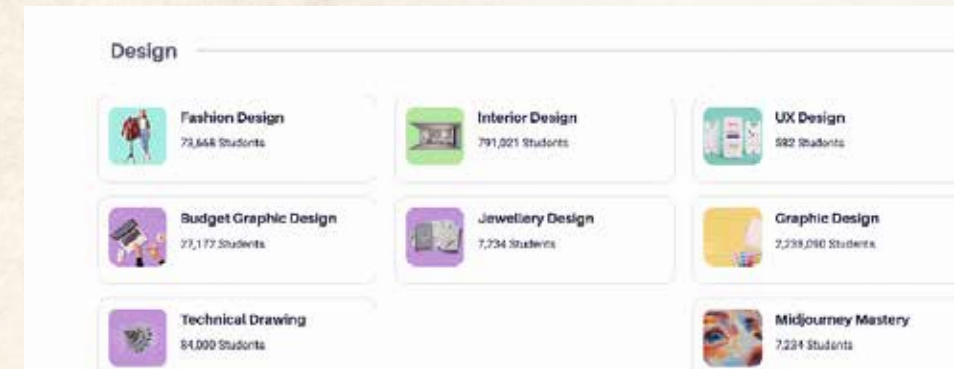

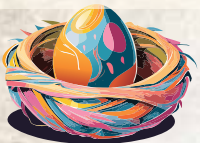

My audience are people that are just getting started with the design - this is the perfect target for the educational institutions.



The plan for my business is to be at the first year to be 2 people only. I will need somebody to help me with the web site content (I have some knowledge of it but I learned it couple years ago and things change so quick in this field, so I need somebody with new information.)






I will need a small place for rent because I think is much more professional to have a physical place and not just online presence. In my area the rent for a commercial small space can go around 800\$ - to 1500\$ per month.

I will need money also for the equipment:

Adobe began in 1982 with the founding of the company by Charles Geschke and John Warnock. They developed Adobe PostScript, which became the first international standard for computer printing.

The company is named after a place called Adobe Creek in Los Altos, California and its headquarter is located in San Jose, California.

In 2011 was created Adobe Creative Cloud. Before that there were couple versions but you needed it to buy them and installed them in your computer. You had them forever but when a new version comes up, you had to buy it because normally many things were different. So, the subscription model was a big change. The Adobe logo was designed by John Warnock's wife - Marva. She was a graphic designer.

FIGMA

According HubSpot, Figma has grown tremendously over the past few years (around 77% of UI designers use it as their preferred design tool). It is expected to have a total market share of about \$16.5 billion by 2025.

Figma comes with many design tools that the developers need and makes work easier for remote teams. It is founded in 2012 by Evan Wallance and Dylan Field.

Figma was about to get bought by Adobe last year and join the family by replacing the Adobe XD but some legal issues arrived and the deal was off.

I think one of the reasons actually was that EU issued a statement saying that the deal shouldn't happened because this will give the green light to Adobe to have monopoly in the global market.

The big plus is that you can create free account and use it as long as you want.

CorelDraw now is available for Mac too. I bought it 6-7 years ago because one of teachers recommended it and then I found out with disappointment that is only for Windows.

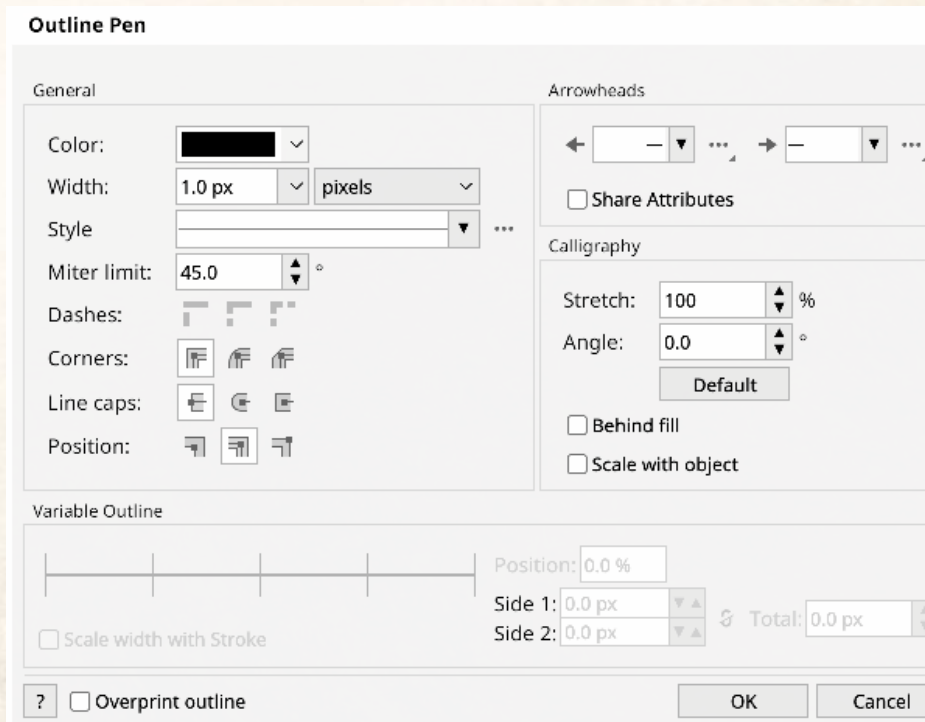

Typography

“**Typography** is the art and technique of arranging type to make written language legible, readable, and visually appealing when displayed.”

“Because design is the art of communication, and written word is our primary means of communication, typography becomes one of the primary components of design. “

Readability is how easily a text can be read. Is often confused with **legibility** witch is the ability the reader to recognize and differentiate between letterforms.

“The designer uses typography in banner ads, maps, social media ads, printed editorials, web page design, newspapers, labels, business cards, magazines, brochures, posters, books, infographics, clothing, application design, logos, branding, presentations, and much more. **It's everywhere.**

As a designer, you will come across the terms font, font family, superfamilies, and typefaces quite often. It is important to know the differences among them. However, it can be rather confusing. Type terminology has evolved with the advent of computer technology. One of the major issues is that the term font has shifted to replace typeface—and even type family in some cases. Now, it is not uncommon to have an extended type family, or superfamily, that has different font classes, such as

serif, sans serif, and slab serif.

Letterforms have different attributes. Sometimes these attributes apply to the typeface as a whole, and other times they apply selectively individual forms and do not appear in all other characters in the typeface.”

Typefaces are classified is terms of height, width, and size.

The height of a typeface is measured from an area below the lower descender to the cap height

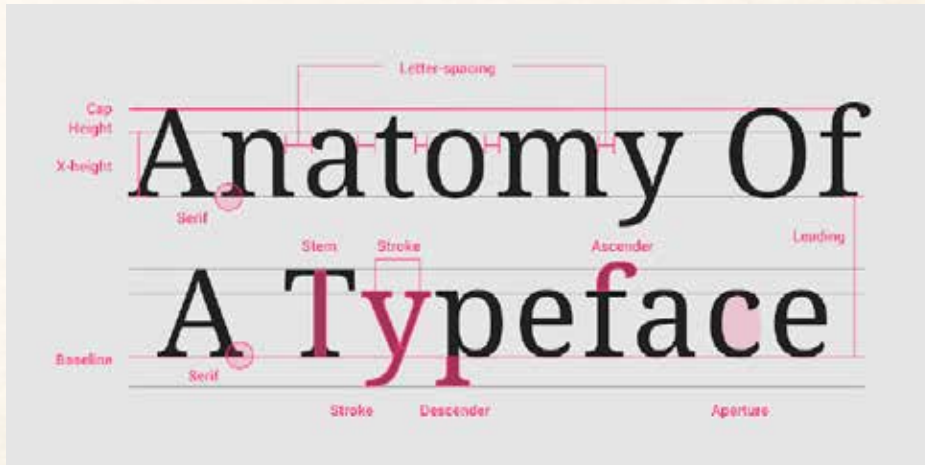
I think that size below 6 or 8 points is very hard to read and should be avoided. The best size for reading is 9 to 12 points.

“**Baseline**: The baseline is the line on which (most of) the letters sit. This is the primary orientation line of all text, and the point of reference for all vertical text alignment in design.

•**Cap Height**: The cap height is both the distance from the baseline to the top of a capital letter and the line which marks that position in reference the baseline.

•**X-Height**: The x-height is both the distance from the baseline to the top of a lowercase letter — excluding ascenders. X-height literally refers to the height of the letter “x.”

• **Axis**: The axis is an imaginary line which displays the angle of stress in a letterform, most noticeable in the letter o. A vertical axis has an angle of stress of zero.

•**Stem**: The stem is a vertical stroke of a upright letterform.

•**Stroke**: The stroke is main diagonal stroke in a letterforms N and M. It is the secondary diagonal stroke in letters W, A, Y and V.

•**Ascender**: An ascender is the upward vertical stroke of a lowercase letter that extends above the x-height. Some ascenders extend above the cap height. The distance between the baseline and the ascender and the line which marks that position is called the ascender height.

•**Descender**: A descender is the downward vertical stroke of a lowercase letter that extends below the baseline. The distance from between the x-height and the bottom edge of the descender and the line that marks that spot is called the descender height.

•**Crossbar**: The crossbar is the horizontal stroke in the middle of a capital letter, specifically and A, H, and B (sometimes also referred to as the bar, arm, or cross stroke).

•**Arm**: An arm is an upward sloping stroke that does not connect to the stroke on one end.

•**Leg**: A leg is a downward sloping stroke that does not connect to the stroke on one end.”

The interplay between line and texture enhances the visual depth and interest in photographs.

Line conveys three-dimensional realism and can flatten an image depending on the angle of light.
Texture relates to the surface quality of objects, providing a “feel” that invites the viewer to engage with the image. The visibility of line and texture can change dramatically with lighting; side lighting enhances texture, while front lighting emphasizes line.

Photographers should learn to notice and combine these elements for effective composition.
The relationship between the subject and negative space can convey stability or tension.
Photographers should learn to recognize and utilize negative space to enhance their images.

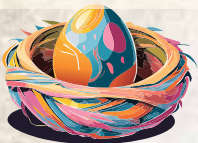

Understanding how to use light meters effectively is essential for accurate exposure.”

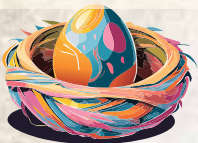

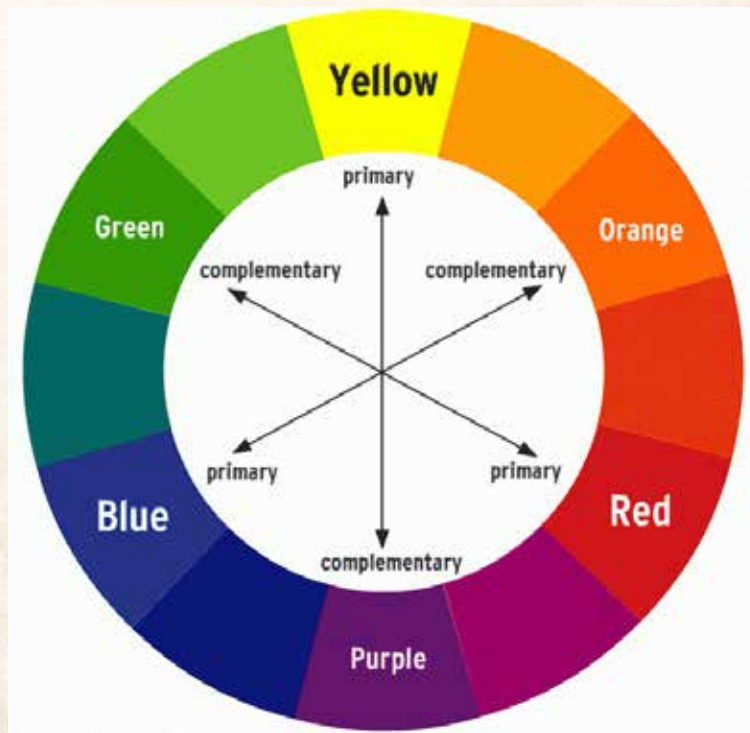


Color Theory

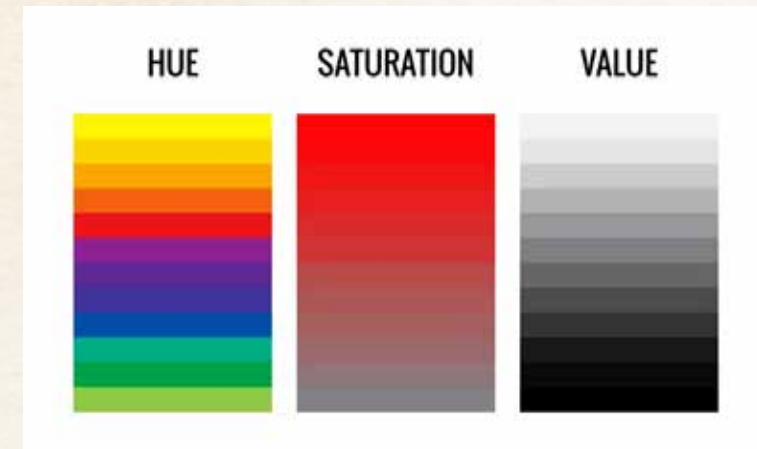
The color wheel dates back to the 17th century and arranges visible colors on a round diagram. It is essential tools in art and design.



Hue is another word for “color,” as in red, blue, and so on.

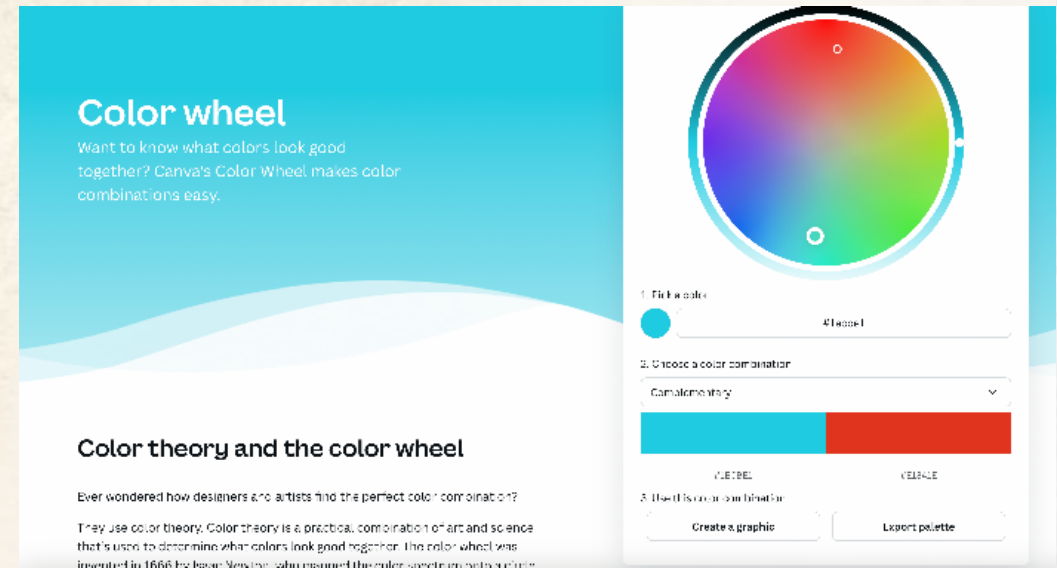
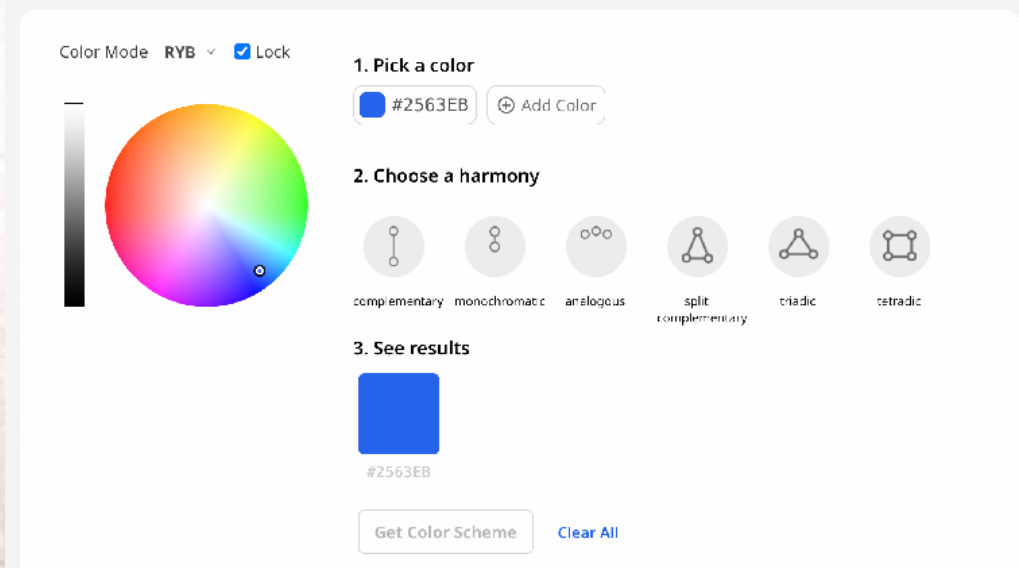
Saturation describes a color’s strength or intensity.

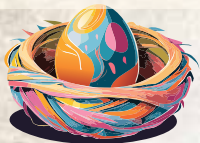

Worried about your job in graphic design? If not, then maybe you should be. Because the latest [Future of Jobs Report](#) from the World Economic Forum (WEF) has delivered sobering news for the profession.

The 2025 report surveyed 1,000 employers representing over 14 million workers across 55 countries and identified graphic design as the 11th fastest-declining job category over the next five years.

That's a stark turnaround from the previous report, which categorised graphic design as a "moderately growing" profession. And there are no prizes for guessing the main culprit.

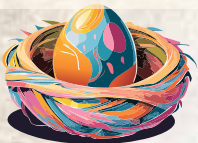
